

USC LEGENDS TEAM

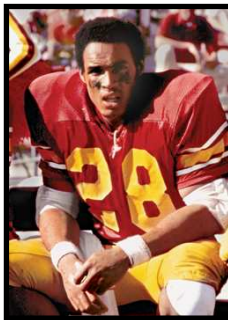
MARCUS ALLEN- #33 Football As a running back for USC, Marcus Allen left a legacy of excellence. In 1981 he had one of the most spectacular seasons in NCAA history by rushing for 2,342 yards, becoming the first player in NCAA history to rush for over 2,000 yards in one season. That year he also won the Heisman Trophy, The Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Award. As a pro he continued his dominance, as demonstrated by playing in 6 Pro Bowls and winning a Super Bowl MVP title. He is in the College Football Hall of Fame and the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



BRET BOONE- #11 Baseball During Bret Boone's 14 years in the Majors, he was selected to the All-Star team 3 times, was a 4-time Gold Glove Award winner, 2 time Silver Slugger Award winner and helped the Seattle Mariners win a league-record 116 games in 2001. That year Bret led the American League in RBIs with 141 and had a 578 slugging percentage. He retired with 252 career home runs.

DON BUFORD- #9 Baseball

Don Buford played baseball at USC under the legendary coach Rod Dedeaux and was a member of the Trojans 1958 National Championship team. During his major league career, Don batted .264 with 93 home runs, 418 RBIs, 718 runs scored and 200 stolen bases. He also showed his baseball talents by only grounding into 34 double plays during his big-league career (4553 at bats). By doing this, he holds the Major League Record for the fewest GIDP hit into, averaging one in every 138 at bats. Don made the All-Star team in 1971 and was a member of the 1970 World Series Champion Baltimore Orioles.



ANTHONY DAVIS- #28 Football/Baseball A multi-talented athlete, Anthony Davis was a college football All-American who led the USC Trojans in rushing, scoring, and kick return yardage for three consecutive seasons. His six career kickoff returns for touchdowns are an NCAA record as well as his kickoff return average of 42.5 yards, which is the highest kickoff return average for any single season leader ever. He was drafted by the New York Jets of the National Football League in the 2nd round of the NFL draft. In baseball A.D. played on the 1974 College World Series champion baseball team hitting .273 with 6 home runs, 45 RBIs and 13 stolen bases for the Trojans.

JANE TEIXEIRA- #21 Softball Jane will be representing the Trojan Athletic Dept as the designated player for Athletic Director Mike Garrett. She played softball for 4 years for the University of Texas and was drafted by the Carolina Diamonds in the Women's Professional Softball League (WPSL)

TOM HOUSE- #26 Baseball Tom House is a well-known pitching guru and coach for USC. After being selected by the Atlanta Braves in the third of the secondary draft, House made his major league debut in 1971. He would play through the 1978 season with career stops at Atlanta, Boston and Seattle. In his 289 major league appearances, House compiled a 29-23 record with a 3.79 ERA and 33 saves. A bit of trivia: Tom caught Hank Aaron's record-setting 715th home run as he sat in the bullpen as a member of the Atlanta Braves.



TOM KELLY- Game Announcer The dean of Southern California football broadcasters, Tom Kelly has described the action of 5 USC national championship football teams, 4 Heisman Trophy winners and 84 first team All-American footballers. Tom also was the executive producer/ host/narrator of the Trojan Video Gold series, highlighting the history of USC football. In his career, he has done play-by-play for just about every sport imaginable and has won numerous awards, including 4 Golden Mikes, 2 AP and UPI California Sportscaster of the Year trophies and an Emmy.



STEVE KEMP- #23 Baseball Steve Kemp had an impressive career at USC before being drafted as the #1 pick into the Majors. At USC he was on two National Championship teams; was a First Team All American; and Collegiate Offensive Player of the Year. He holds the school's record for a season's batting average of .438 and career batting average of .390. Steve was drafted by the Detroit Tigers where during his best season he hit .318 with 26 home runs and 105 RBI, earning him a spot on the All-Star team.

FRED LYNN- #8 Baseball After graduation from USC, Fred Lynn started his career for the Boston Red Sox with a phenomenal 1975 season in which he won the Most Valuable Player and Rookie of the Year awards, the first player ever to win both in the same season. In 1975, Lynn led the American League in doubles, runs scored and slugging percentage, finished second in the batting race with a .331 average, and won a Gold Glove Award. Lynn has 306 career home runs.



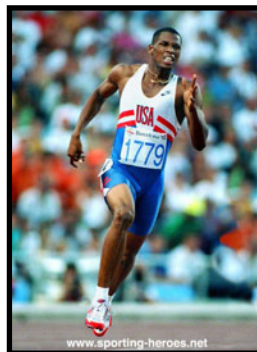
INGER MILLER- #7 Track & Field Inger Miller has amassed an impressive list of achievements during her career in track and field. At USC she won the 100m and 200m at the Pac-10 Championships in 1994. She was on the Gold Medal winning 4x100m relay team during the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was a Gold Medalist in the 1997 World Championships in the same event. She also won a Gold Medal at the World Championships in the 200m in 1999.

KEN MILLER- #4 Baseball (Manager) Ken Miller is the President of the USC Baseball Alumni Association and co-creator of this event. At USC Ken was an All-American 1st baseman, starting every game for USC for all three years and was a member of the 1958 National Championship team. He also played on a team in Canada that won the national championship and played in the Global World Series. After college Ken signed with the NY Yankees where he played for a year. This game is a tribute to his brother Don who died of ALS in 1999.



JOHNNIE MORTON- #80 Football While a wide receiver at USC, Johnnie Morton led in receiving in 1991 (49 catches), 1992 (49 catches) and 1993 (88 catches, fourth in USC history) He also led USC in scoring in 1993 and is third on USC's career receiving list with 201 catches. Johnnie was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions.

VIC LAPINER- #19 Baseball Vic Lapiner holds the school record for wins in a season with a 27-3 record. He was drafted by the Cleveland Indians organization where in his first year Vic compiled a 17-5 record with a 1.96 era. Vic was later inducted into the Southern California Jewish Sports Hall of Fame for his excellence in baseball.



QUINCY WATTS- #43 Track & Field Quincy Watts attended USC where he excelled not only as a track star but also a wide receiver on the football team. Running the 400 m, he won the Gold in the '92 Olympics. He twice broke Lee Evens' Olympic record of 43.86, (set at altitude) during the '68 games in Mexico, clocking 43.71 in his semi-final, before going on to record 43.50 in the final. He was a member of the 4 x 400 m relay team, running the second leg in 43.10, which smashed the world record in a time of 2:55.74.

CHARLES WHITE- #12 Football During his illustrious career at USC, Charles White won the W.J. Voit Memorial Trophy, the Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Award, and was named UPI Player of the Year. White was selected in the 1st round of the NFL draft by the Cleveland Browns. In 1987 he enjoyed his finest year as a pro with the Rams, rushing for a league-leading 1,387 yards and 11 touchdowns, which he earned him a Pro Bowl berth and the Comeback Player of the Year Award.
